

The newsletter team dedicates this issue to Bishop-Designate Hanchell and his family, for their tireless work in ministry. We open this edition with a one-on-one interview with our incoming Bishop and our Co-Pastor.

What process did you go through to receive this honor?

The only process I can point to is serving. I have been faithful in serving our great organization in whatever capacity I have been given. I have served as a college/young adult pastor, assistant dean of Calvary Bible Institute, International Youth/Young Adult President, General Secretary, and as a Senior Pastor. I always teach that God honors faithfulness, and my life is a reflection of that. I have served faithfully at whatever my hand found to do, and God has chosen to honor that faithfulness. I am extremely grateful for the opportunity to serve.

What impact do you hope to make as you are being elevated?

I hope to continue making an impact on the lives of individuals in the local church as well as on the national level. One of the things I am grateful for is that I am not just being elevated to a title - but to a function. I will be consecrated as the Bishop of Administration for MCHCA, which will allow me to help shape some of the administrative processes for our national and international work. It is a great responsibility and a great honor. I am truly humbled that God - through our Presiding Bishop - selected me for this honor.

What do you think is the greatest challenge for the 21st century Bishop?

A bishop in the 21st century faces unique challenges and opportunities. We are living in a very pluralistic, multicultural, postmodern society that does not readily accept the teachings of the Bible, so 21st century bishops must be bold in proclaiming and protecting the faith, while also being open to new ways of reaching those who may have no family or traditional connection to the Church. This also presents an opportunity because, with the advent of social media, the 21st century bishop has an opportunity to minister to the masses unlike any generation prior.

The laws seem to be changing daily, what we can't control it would seem we legalize; from gay rights, marijuana and the recent health care initiative...how will you encourage the church to

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maintain what God says verses what the world says?

We must continue to uphold the biblical standard - regardless of the winds of political persuasions or popular opinions. When we keep Christ at the center of our ministry, we have a firm foundation on which to stand. Having said that, the Church must be careful that we do not shut ourselves off completely from the world. We cannot effect change if we are not willing to engage. When we engage the culture, we can help change the culture.

How do you not compromise your core values, as you are being elevated to a higher authority within the body of Christ?

I do not believe that elevation is a threat to my core values at all. Elevation does not change our identity, it only changes our assignment. My core values will not be compromised because of my elevation. In fact, I am being elevated partly because of my core values.

As leaders in ministry, if you could embark upon this journey all over again? What would you do differently to show proficiency in leading others in Christ?

I don't know that there are many things I would do differently. We have been blessed to lead a vibrant congregation for over eight years now. When we got here the church had been wounded and was struggling. There were only about 40 people in worship on a Sunday, and there was little to no money in the church coffers. Now, nearly nine years later, we see many signs of positive growth. We average nearly 3 times the amount of people in weekly worship than when we got here, and by God's grace and the help of a committed congregation, we have been able to achieve some great things.

Instead of focusing on what we could have done differently in the past, I get excited thinking about what we can achieve in the future. I believe that God has poised our church for amazing growth and to make a tremendous impact in our community and beyond. We truly are becoming "The Church Committed to Do MORE", and I do believe that the best is yet to come!

How will your understanding of personal and professional boundaries affect your practice of ministry; as well as your elevation into the office of Bishop?

Boundaries are an important part of any leader's life. I try to maintain proper boundaries in my professional as well as in my personal life. These will not change with my elevation to the bishopric. I understand that my first priority is my relationship with God, then my family. Everything else is a distant third - including ministry. As I often tell other pastors, "Your marriage is more important than my ministry, and my children are more important than your church." I try to live by these words and make sure that my family know that while I am called to be a pastor, I was created to be a husband and a father. This cannot be done successfully without setting and maintaining proper boundaries.

Co -Pastor Victoria, as Bishop Designate Hanchell prepares himself for this elevation, how will you help him in the balancing act of life- Father, Husband, Bishop, Author, Chaplain, Speaker, Preacher, etc?

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Pastor Hanchell and I have been married through several transitions including his transition of holding a masters degree to earning a Ph.D., transitioning from an elder to senior pastor, from a senior pastor to the General Secretary of our organization (MCHCA, incorporated), and as the International Youth and Young Adult President for MCHCA. Throughout these transitions he has maintained his employment as a chaplain, became an author of two books, all while being a father to his children and a wonderful spouse to me. As I have done in the past, I will continue to flourish as his help-meet. I will assist him by helping him meet the needs of whatever he faces because he is my husband.

What has changed about you since you first became the Pastor/Co-Pastor of MCHCWS?

Well, one thing is that I have a few more gray hairs on top of my head :-)

On a serious note, I don't know that I can point to any one area in which I have changed. I can only say that overall I have grown, and growth equals change. I heard a quote recently from Winston Churchill that says, "To grow is to change, and to perfect is to change often."

Co-Pastor Victoria's Response:


One thing that has changed is my ability to slow down in my method of implementation. When we first came to Winston Salem, NC we had a plan of action for one month, three months, six months.. etc..When we arrived, we quickly tossed the plan aside because we had to learn and love on the people of rather than focus on the implementation of a six-month action plan. I am very task-oriented in my leadership approach, both in ministry and in the secular arena, but I have slightly(:) enhanced my leadership approach to become somewhat more relationship-driven.

If you had the ability to instantly change on thing about the ministry what would it be?

One thing we constantly strive to do better with is our discipleship and retention. I would love to see us strengthen our follow-up procedures and do a better job of retaining the gifts God sends our way.

Co-Pastor Victoria's Reponse:

We would be on TV for a weekly broadcast! We would have the appropriate lighting, duplication of our services, voiceover for the intro/outro and more! The ability to televise our services both nationally and internationally would be what I would instantly change. Our pastor is a phenomenal preacher and the world must hear his voice. I believe TV is part of the way to communicate the message that the Lord has given to him and win more souls to Christ.



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Co-Pastor Victoria Reflects



Years ago, while a member at Greater Mount Calvary Holy Church in Washington DC, our International First Lady Co-pastor Susie, made the following statement that is forever etched in my mind: “It is one thing to attain, it is a totally different thing to maintain.”


As the Lord has afforded Pastor Hanchell and I with several opportunities of elevation, it has been customary for me to look forward with excitement, but to dedicate more time to reflection. With elevation there should be reflection. For me, elevation is a time to look back over the previous lessons learned because God has allowed me to attain certain levels, but it is through knowledge and wisdom that I am able to maintain that which I acquire.

I have always prayed that as God opens doors for Bishop - Designate Hanchell and I, that we will maintain that which God places in our hands. God has honored My request. So upon arrival to Winston-Salem, NC, we attained a church that had a few dollars in savings and an average of 40 church attenders. Over the course of 8 years we see an average of 125-150 persons per Sunday, never missed a mortgage payment on the church, we have 4 persons on staff, and been able to maintain our property while making several upgrades in our facility (parking lot pavement, AV equipment, etc...). God has allowed us to attain and maintain.

While maintaining the ministry here in Winston-Salem, there are personal growth lessons I have learned... So many lessons in fact, I have written a book that will be launched in May 2014 called WOW: Women of Wisdom -24 Karat Nuggets of Wisdom. This is a book that I detail nuggets of wisdom and lessons learned that were illuminated in my mind during personal times of reflection. One lesson included in this book is, “Listen with your left ear”- this means criticism will come and yes you should listen to some critics...but only listen partially (listen with your left ear) because you never want to take all of the negative comments into “both ears” because it could paralyze your productivity... And ain’t nobody got time for being paralyzed in our productivity!

So when elevation comes, reflection is key because it helps to mentally sort “how we got over”, and how we overcame, so as we ascend to the next level we can be elevated with the confidence of knowing that if God allowed us to maintain in our previous level, that he will do the same and even greater in the next season we are walking into! I give God all of the glory for which he has done and what he will do through us!

Interview with Bishop Walt and Elder Minalee Hanchell

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Thank you for taking time out of your schedules to answer a few questions about Bishop-Designate Hanchell!

When did you first realize Bishop-Designate Hanchell had a call on his life?

When he was 4 years old, he came home from school and said that he accepted Jesus as Lord of his life. When he was 7, we were at a church service and the preacher said that she felt led for a young person to come up and minister to people who were sick. Without any delay or prompting by anyone, he went up and began touching people's foreheads and they were falling out under the power of God! Afterwards, we got testimonies that people of people being healed whom he prayed for!

What's the funniest moment you can remember from his childhood?

This is not a moment in particular, but our son always liked to dress up! No matter where he was going as a child, he was dressed to impress. There was one thing in particular that he felt like he always had to add to his outfit.....cowboy boots! He wore those cowboy boots EVERYWHERE, even at home.




From the first time I met Bishop Designate Hanchel, I could sense that he had the same spirit as our church founder, the late Bishop Brumfield Johnson.

Zaria: *making lots of money and writing a lot of books so that he can buy me one hundred dolls*


Zion: *I want my dad to preach good and buy stuff for me.*
